1922 Rose Bowl opens - Pasadena going for the world stage.

- 1928 Huntington Gardens opened to public Breathless beauty and proud resource to the area.
- 1934 Santa Anita Time to have some fun, and build a world class venue.
- 1936 Jet Propulsion Lab (JPL) Let's think outside the box called Earth

1939 "The Greatest Gift" (Philip Van Doren Stern) - a book

1946 "It's a Wonderful Life" - We all know the classic film

1976 ArtCenter College of Design moves to Pasadena - there is creativity in them hills!

1976 La Canada Flintridge incorporated - Here we come !

1978 La Canada Flintridge Tournament of Roses formed - Following the Pasadena footstep!.

Look at what Pasadena did in short order for the area and for the world. Those are not islands of achievements, those were done as a Village. La Canada Flintridge has definitely set its' feet firmly in the terra firma of this success template; and great things have and will continue to come. With great achievement comes inspiration that drives others to want to emulate, and that drives greatness forward.

Construction Shenanigans

Here's what's happening at the Construction Site.

Last newsletter we reported that the 3 propane tanks were removed for sanding and painting. This month they are all done, looking good and re-installed on the chassis.

The hydraulic hose project is also moving forward. Bright red metal tubes have been installed to protect the hoses and eliminate tripping hazards. We are setting up the connections and ordering six new hoses.

The paint inventory is complete, and the paint shed is looking good. We are ready to paint in the fall.

We are making strides at site. The foam carving table is finished and in place. The old workbench is in its new home next to the paint/Floatique shed. The welding table in front of the main storage container is straight and level...thank you, Dwight and Mike.

We still have more spring cleaning to do and could use your help. The sockets need to be put in their proper place and the metal rack could use some organizing. There are still plenty of carriages to disassemble. Sounds like a fun Saturday morning!

We await the float drawing so we can get scaled drawings made and then the real fun starts.

To keep everyone safe, we will be putting the plywood panels and handrails on the chassis in May for the Fiesta Days Parade.

Remember When: A Past President Looks Back



The Float Year & Float Manual in a Single Sentence

Recently, I spent 4 days in a writing workshop where we had some writing exercises. One was called 'The Art of the Long, Long Sentence'. So, play along; read it out loud from start to finish only breathing at the punctuation marks. Please no stopping until you get to the period at the end. If you want, record your best try, post it on Twitter, Facebook or Instagram referencing LCFTRA in your post.

"Every 13 months, December to the second January, all floats in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade begin as a concept (December – January); are drawn in monochrome and color (January – February), are selected and approved (February – March); are designed, presented, approved (April-June); are engineered, approved, tested mechanically (June); built in steel, aluminum screen, foam and tested (June-September); are animated, foamed, painted, tested (September-December); are decorated (December15-29); are judged, decorated and judged again (December 30-31); are convoyed, unstowed, parked, bunched (December 31), enter the chute, start the parade, turn TV Corner, turn Sierra Madre corner; enter Float Fest; are checked, parked, unstowed, animated (January 1); are animated, stowed, bunched, convoyed home, and parked (January 2); are rested, moved to Memorial Park (around January 7); are parked, shown off to the hometown crowd, convoyed home; parked for deconstruction (January); now, take deep breaths; and start again."

As you can see from articles in this Newsletter, LCFTRA has a float for the 2023 Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade: "Secondhand Shenanigans". The float is a celebration of turning the corners in our lives as we achieve great milestones. If you go back to the piece that you just read, the Association has just achieved every milestone in the sentence up to and including 'April'.

Melanie Feliciano, a friend and accountability partner, got fascinated by the sentence and actually did a reading. I have attached <u>her link</u> for you to hear her blast through the float year and the float manual in a single sentence. She had an earlier version which helped me edit.
